# Universalist Heritage Sermon Award 2011

Both ordained clergy and lay preachers are eligible for this award. We especially encourage seminarians to send us their sermons.

- ☛ *Bridging the divide between Humanists and Theists that can so often paralyze theological discussion in our congregations*
- ☛ *Helping people to confront their Christian or Jewish religious pasts, and to re-appropriate what can still nourish them*
- ☛ *Approaching nature-based spirituality from the Universalist perspective.*

Each day we will share and reflect on one or more stories on the theme, "Love Saves." We will also share meditations, hymns, and other worship material. Each day we also will hear or preach a Universalist-style sermon, delivered without a manuscript.

# “A Love Saves Story”

Several years before the shootings at Columbine High School, I was in my office there when a call came into the church. It was a call from a payphone (this was before the time of cell phones). I could tell it was a payphone because I could hear the road traffic. A young-sounding voice asked me if I was the minister of the Unitarian Universalist Church. I was hoping at the time that it was a call about the Gay and Lesbian Choral Concert at our church later that week. We had put up posters advertising the concert all over our neighborhood – and the posters would be ripped down almost as fast as we put them up.

The voice on the phone didn't ask about the concert. I was asked only this, “Does your church believe it's OK to be gay?”

Please understand that this neighborhood was dominated by evangelicals, so I answered in what I thought would be the most useful theology. “God loves us no matter if we are gay or straight,” I answered.

“Thank you.” Click.

Several days after the shootings at Columbine High School, a young woman came to see me. She had just come-out as a lesbian to her family. Her father was a prominent minister of a large evangelical church. Her family had expelled her from their home and banished her from their lives. It was this young woman's first and only time in our church, and we spoke for a long time that day. I remember our conversation so vividly because she told me she had been that lonely high school kid whose only ray of hope in life had once been a phone number on a forbidden poster, then a payphone call to a small, new church and its courage in the face of hate. She told me that we had very literally saved her life. For several years just our existence as the Columbine Unitarian Universalist Church was reason enough for her to choose life rather than end it.

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## News from the Board

## Standing Free:

### *Preaching the Gospel of Love in the Universalist Style*

On Saturday March 26th, nineteen people gathered at the Universalist Memorial Church in Winchester, NH for a day long workshop on extemporaneous preaching. Rev. Dr. M'ellen Kennedy and Rev. Stephen Shick led the workshop which was made possible in part by a grant from the New York State Convention of Universalists. Most of the participants were Unitarian Universalist clergy, with a few from other faith traditions as well. We ranged from one person with almost thirty years of ministry experience to one still in seminary. A few lay leaders and District Staff also participated.

We had a wonderful day together. Participants especially enjoyed the two small group ministry experiences which gave them an opportunity to get to know each other, talk about their fears and try preaching without a text, for just five minutes for starters. In the evaluation, the participants rated the workshop highly. One participant indicated that what s/he liked best was, "the collegiality, the sharing, the mutual vulnerability." Trying this form of preaching alone can indeed feel intimidating and isolating. Another person indicated that they liked "being with others on the same path." The participants agreed that they found the workshop worthwhile and came away with ideas and enthusiasm about extemporaneous preaching.

The historic Ballou pulpit resides in the Winchester church but doesn't get much use. It has a low, flat surface rather than the slanted surface more common now in Unitarian Universalist churches. The flat top is not practical for preaching with a manuscript, but ideal for preaching in the traditional style, that is manuscript-free. For the workshop, we carried the Ballou pulpit from its storage place on the side to the middle of the chancel. Some of us had the chance to speak from this historic pulpit where Hosea Ballou was likely ordained. It felt as though we connected deeply with the taproot of our heritage and at the same time, took one giant, exhilarating collective step forward. The day was a gift. Thanks so much to the Universalist Heritage Foundation for hosting us and making it all possible.

## **A New DVD Presents Rev. Olympia Brown**

A new Universalist Heritage DVD has been completed and shipment is expected soon. This video features the Rev. Janet H. Bowering in her renowned portrayal of the Rev. Olympia Brown (1835-1926), a Universalist minister and the first woman in America to achieve full ministerial standing in a religious denomination. In this thirty-minute presentation, Jan Bowering portrays Olympia in her later years as her considerable energies are focused on achieving equal rights for women. She was one of the few original suffragists who lived to vote in the 1920 presidential election. The narrative also presents Olympia reflecting back on her family life and her challenges to be accepted into theological school and active ministry. She becomes a lively presence through Jan's compelling telling of her story.

The Rev. Janet H. Bowering is minister emerita of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Haverhill, MA and a member of the Universalist Heritage Foundation Board. She has a long history of service as well, with particular devotion to the Unitarian Universalist Women's Federation and the Clara Barton Camp for Diabetic Children. She has offered her portrayal of Olympia Brown more than forty times.

This presentation is good entertainment, but more than that, it is a rich source of history. It is an excellent resource for programs in Unitarian Universalist history and identity, appealing not only to adults, but to teens as well. Women's groups would have a special interest in it.
